



PORTLAND SWAP MEET





Time passes quickly when you're having fun.


After dinner Glenn and I did what any two guys away from their wives on Friday night would do - went back to the room and watched T.V.

Up early Saturday morning for first shot at the rare goodies that we know are on the tables. A brisk walk






interested in the electronic games at the Firehouse Pizzeria than us. Our companions, Leisha and Kim Apker, duely chaperoned by their parents.


The April 18th garage tour began with breakfast at the Bellevue Holiday Inn. Both Classics and special interest cars filled the parking lot, attracting the







The open events are:

FRIDAY, JULY 30

All Regional members are invited to join the Caravan participants aboard the steamship Virginia V for a cruise that includes cocktails and an elegant meal. 
SUNDAY, AUGUST 1
