As I reflect back on 1988, I feel proud to have been Director of the Pacific Northwest Region. With the Regional Annual Meeting and the Christmas Party behind us, it's time to enjoy the warm memories of this past year. I would like to thank the many members who contributed to such a tremendous variety of events, and a special thank you to all of the Board members for their extra time and effort. The 1989 Calendar of Events is currently being developed by Richard Adatto. Please feel free to contact Richard with any ideas or suggestions. It's your club! Lets make 1989 a Classic year for the Pacific Northwest Region.

It is with grave concern, and yet with extreme optimism that I present the following dilemma facing our Region. We have come to enjoy an enlarged and enhanced Eumper Guardian this past year. The higher quality and extended coverage has been greeted with raves and increased enjoyment. Yet a price must be paid for this improvement in our publications. We all understand the importance of our publications. They are the heartbeat that keeps the spirit flowing for our membership.

To be direct and to the point, our Region operated with a budget deficit of approximately \$4000.00 for the year 1988. Profits from fund-raising events of prior years covered this deficit. There is currently no revenue-generating event planned for 1989. This budget problem has been extensively discussed by your Board of Managers and numerous suggestions have been contemplated and enacted. First of all, all events for 1989 must be financially solvent. The Club will not underwrite any part of the cost for club functions. Secondly, a modest increase in dues was initiated for 1989. The editors have also begun numerous cost cutting steps to reduce the publication budget. Yet a \$3000.00 deficit is still expected if we maintain the current number of issues and the quality of the Bumper Guardian.

After considerable deliberation, your Board of Managers has decided upon a fund raising drive to cover this deficit. After researching how other regional publications are funded, it has been determined that a contribution campaign must be instituted. Additionally, we will concentrate on an advertising campaign. We need to double our advertising sales space with both automotive and non-automotive ads. If you are not able to advertise a business, you may wish to purchase space to run a photo of your car with your compliments, which could be enjoyed by the membership and also help fulfill the revenue needs of the Club. Lets maintain the high quality of our publishers. Please support this fund-raising campaign. Proposed advertising layouts and costs are displayed elsewhere in this Eumper Bolts. Our editor will be pleased to discuss your needs and locks forward to a warm and generous response from our membership. All donations are tax deductable to the extent provided by law.

There is no doubt that the collector car hobby has been financially rewarding to our membership. The value of our cars has increased dramatically during the past few years. Part of this is due to the comradship that a club offers. Lets help pay back this small debt of gratitude.

As a final note, I would like a member from the general membership to volunteer as Advertising Campaign Chairman to coordinate this fund raising project. Please contact me or your editor at your earliest convenience.





# mary Lynn's Saup!

1/3 cup best quality olive oil large yellow onion cut into thin rings 4 large carrots, peeled and thickly sliced 1 fennel bulb, chopped 2 large potatoes, peeled and diced 3 medium-size zucchini, diced 12 cups diagonally sliced green beans 1 cup green cabbage, shredded 6 cans Swanson Beef Stock 2 cans water 1 can (35 oz.) Italian plum tomatoes 2 tablespoons dried oregano 1 tablespoon dried basil Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste Outer rind of a 2-in. chunk Parmesan cheese  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups canned cannellini (white kidney beans, 1 pound cheese-stuffed tortellini drained | 12 pounds sweet Italian sausage, pan fried and sliced

Freshly-grated Fontina cheese.

- 1. Heat the oil in a large stock pot over medium heat. Add the onion and sauté for 10 to 15 minutes.
- 2. Stir in the carrots and sauté 2 to 3 minutes, tossing occasionally.
- 3. Add the fennel, potatoes, green pepper, zucchini, and green beans, sautéing each vegetable 2 to 3 minutes before adding the next. When all the vegetables have been added to the pot, stir in the cabbage and cook 5 minutes more.
- 4. Add the stock, water, tomatoes with their juices, oregano, basil, and salt and pepper to taste. Bury the Parmesan rind in the middle of the soup. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer covered over low heat for 2½ to 3 hours. The soup will be very thick.
- 5. Fifteen minutes before serving, stir in the cannellini beans and tortellini. Raise the heat to cook the tortellini, but stir the soup occasionally to keep it from sticking to the bottom of the pot. Just before serving, stir in the sausage.
- 6. Ladle the minestrone into shallow pasta bowls and garnish lavishly with Fontina.





Myra's Granberry Dessert

- 4 cups (11/3 packages, 12-oz. size) fresh or frozen cranberries
- 1½ cups sugar 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/2 cup raspberry jam
  Almond crust (recipe follows)
  Candied peel (recipe follows)
  Custard sauce (optional, recipe

In a 3- to 4-quart pan over low heat, cook cranberries and sugar until cranberries are translucent and begin to collapse, about 30 minutes (45 minutes if frozen); occasionally shake pan gently to mix.

Set a strainer over a bowl. Pour berries into strainer. Let stand until cool. Return juice to pan and blend with cornstarch. Stirring, bring to rolling boil on high heat. Add jam and stir until it melts. Add cranberries and mix gently; pour into crust.

Mound candied peel in center of tart. Let stand at room temperature until filling is firm enough to hold its shape when cut, about 2 hours, or up until next day (cover loosely when cool). Cut into wedges. Offer custard sauce to pour over individual servings. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

Almond crust. In a food processor or blender, whirl 4 cup unblanched almonds until finely ground. If using a blender, transfer ground nuts to a bowl. To almonds, add 1 cup all-purpose flour, 4 cup (4/4 lb.) butter or margarine (at room temperature), 4 cup sugar, 2 large egg yolks, 2 teaspoons unsweetened cocoa, and 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon. Whirl or rub with fingers until dough holds together. Press dough firmly into a 12-inch tart pan with removable bottom, making bottom crust slightly thicker than rim.

Bake in a 350° oven until richly browned, 20 to 30 minutes. Remove from oven and gently remove pan sides, then gently slide a long spatula or knife between pan and crust to loosen crust, keeping pastry in place on pan and being careful not to break the fragile rim. Let cool.


