





Board of Managers, Minutes, May 2, 1990

The meeting was called to order by Assistant Director Mounger at 6:50 p.m. at Latitude 47 Restaurant in Seattle. Present were Managers Cook, Deibel, Goffette, McGary, and Madden; Secretary Barber; Past Director Greenfield; and members Adatto, Bomstead, Linke, McEwan, McMichael, Reddaway, and Zukor. The minutes of the April 4, 1990, Meeting were approved as corrected.

The Treasurer's report was submitted by Sissy Madden, showing a balance of \$6,868.25. The membership chairman reported in absentia that difficulties had been encountered in preparing the roster, but hoped for a resolution of these soon.

In a discussion of the club publication, the following fixed costs per issue based on number of pages was reported from Bill Finefrock: 8 pp, \$445; 12 pp, \$620; 16 pp, \$820. These figures include all production costs except halftones, which will run an additional \$4 each. Additionally there would be a \$60 annual third class bulk permit, plus about \$60 per mailing. These costs are based on nine issues plus the directory. The publications committee agreed with this and adopted a 12 (or fewer) page format with issues coming out on odd numbered months.

The following events were discussed: Summerville Garden Party, April 14, Chairman Goffette, who reported that there was a good

turnout of 30-plus cars which completed the tour in two groups.

Adatto/Madden/Linke. Sponsor: LaBatt's beer, will donate \$1,000 to club plus free beer.

Kite Fly, May 5, Chairmen Goffette/Herstein. Departures at 9:30 from the Lynwood Burgermaster to get the 11 a.m. ferry, arriving at Ft. Casey at noon.

Land-Sea-Air, June 22-24, Port Ludlow, Chairman Grisham. Flier will be out soon. G. Greenfield noted that the HCCA was planning a one-day event that Saturday.

Parade, July 4, Chairman McEwan (Yarrow Point), Johnsen/Mounger (Bainbridge). Schedule for the latter is parade starting at 11 a.m., cars in place by 10.

Mulholland Drive "Rally," July 14.

PNR CARavan, July 20-27, Chairman McEwan. A letter is out requesting the first installment (\$250 per person) of the "package." The waiting list has dwindled, but some are hanging on. The extra condo is not confirmable until 30 days before the event. The boat for the planned opening party has been sold. B. McKinley will host a brunch as previously. J. McAuliffe will host coffee and donuts. 35-40 regional members are signed up. R. Adatto will help find trailer space. The video is still viable, but no definite arrangements have been made. 110 license plates have been ordered.

Apker Affair, Aug. 12. Bomstead/ Mounger, Club Co-chairmen, Linke assisting. Chandler's Cover, Aug. 26. Co-chairmen Adatto/Madden/Linke. Sponsor: LaBatt's beer, will donate \$1,000 to club plus free beer. All collector cars welcome, classics preferred. Covered display area if necessary; classic speed boats will be shown also.

Garage Tour, Sept. 22, Chairman McGary. No further news.

Auction, Oct. 27, Chairmen McGary/Apker. McGary will prepare article for both club's publication and a flyer as a "procurement slip." Kane and Gerrity are responsible for procurement of items to be sold. If a car is auctioned, there will be a reserve for the owner, plus a "commission" for the clubs.

Annual Meeting, Nov. 3, Sand Point Country Club, Chairman Deibel. No further news.

Christmas Party, Dec. A committee consisting of B. Deibel, N. Cook and C. Bomstead will report on the feasibility of having or omitting the Christmas Party for this year.

Coming Out Party, March 23?, '91, Marriott, Chairman McMichael. Hotel management has promised to correct food problem encountered this year.

Grand Classic, July '91, Chairman Greenfield. Major effort will start after CARavan.

The board agreed to give a donation of \$50 to Boys of Italy in memory of Sergio Franchi.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:50 p.m. The next meeting will be June 6, 1990, at Latitude 47.




The Pacific University President's Trophy went to a 1953 Cadillac Convertible (NC) owned by Kenneth McBride of Seattle.

The Guy Carr Trophy is given to the oldest driveable car on the field. Ed and Inez Gill and their 1908 Glide (NC) won this year.


The Arnold Franks Rotary Sweepstakes Award went to Jim Classen in his 1936 Packard rumble seat convertible coupe.



Gene and Lois Bradshaw's 1930 Cadillac 8, Model 353, 4 door sedan with Fleetwood body.



Club to publish book on classic cars

The Classic Car Club of America will publish a 600-plus page book featuring approximately 700 classic cars in more than 1,200 photographs.

The book, appropriately named *The Classic Car*, is slated for introduction late this year in time for the holiday gift giving season.

Since the beginning of the automobile collecting hobby, the question has been asked, "What is a classic car?"

The Classic Car Club of America, with more than 6,500 members in practically every country of the world, hopes to end this ageold controversy with a comprehensive book that will cover the entire classic era, from the earliest models produced in 1925 to the last recognized classics manufactured in 1948.

During the late 1930s, when the early automobiles were beginning to be recognized by historical collector, the cars built after 1925 were considered "too new" by most enthusiasts. During the early postwar period, a person driving a 1929 Cadillac to an antique car meet would actually be told he could not participate because he was driving a modern automobile! This is hard for most collectors to realize today, but it was true.

It took a number of years before the great classics came to be recognized for what they resented.

How did the great classics come about? With the onset of mass production, it had become increasingly easier to own a car. By

the mid-1920s, wealthy and discriminating citizens of the world were making their needs and desires known.

They wanted luxury, style, performance, choice of colors, interior fabrics and leathers, accommodations for traveling, sometimes the provision for a chauffeur and always the dedication to detail that is the hallmark of superb craftsmanship. In other words, they did not want mass-produced automobiles. Without knowing it at the time, they spawned what we refer to today as the classic car.

The Classic Car Club of America was formed in 1952 for "the development, publication and interchange of technical, historical and other information for and among members and other persons who own or are interested in fine or unusual, foreign or domestic, motor cars. . .distinguished for their fine design, engineering standards and superior workmanship; and to promote social intercourse and fellowship among its members, to maintain references upon and encourage the maintenance, restoration and preservation of all such classic cars."

The term "classic" would mean those cars so classified by the club.

This is the beginning of the controversy. What is a classic? Why is this car a classic, what isn't this car a classic, and who determines this?

The classic era was defined chronologically by the CCCA as the period from 1925 through 1948, the models built in the early post-World War II period being essentially carry-overs from the prewar cars.

Within the classic era, the CCCA makes the difficult decision as to which automobiles are granted classic status. Painstaking research is involved in the selection process.

The long list of CCCA-certified classic cars has been accepted worldwide. Virtually all automobile clubs embrace the cars designated by the CCCA as the only cars to be recognized as classic. Almost every state issuing historic auto license plates refers to the CCCA Handbook and Directory for guidance. The club is proud of this recognition and respect.


In this new book, the classic era and every marque designated a classic will be reviewed; the grand production cars, the, extraordinary custom-built cars, classic of every body style and year.

All of the photographs in the book will be of member cars. The text will relate the history of that particular classic and the experiences the owner has had with it.

The two-year book project is being directed by Beverly Rae Kimes, executive editor of CCCA, and the national board of directors of the club, with the cooperation of the entire membership in donating their time and the use of their maryelous classic cars.

The Classic Car will be sold and distributed worldwide. Watch for pre-publication information in most auto-related publications.


