



## Board of Managers, Minutes, Sept. 5, 1990

The meeting was called to order by Director Rittenhouse at 7 pm at Latitude 47 Restaurant in Seattle. Present were Managers Deibel, Gerrity, Goffette, Kane, Madden and McGary; Secretary Barber; Treasurer Wouters; Past-Director Greenfield; and members Aker, Grisham, Johnsen, LeCoque, Linke, McEwan, Meden and Zuker. The minutes of the Aug. 8, 1990 meeting were approved as corrected. The treasurer reported a balance of \$4224.78. Bills for publications have been paid but the \$1000 from Chandler's Cove show is not included. It was also noted that \$2000 had been advanced the Caravan account. Chairman. McEwan commented that a significant amount would be turned over to the club treasury when all Caravan accounting was completed. Membership Chairman Johnsen reported no additional members.

In a discussion about publications, Membership Chairman Johnsen expressed concern about the quality of the roster, criticizing the lack of a cover, crowded format, and poor readability. Some others agreed and thought the old format was better. All felt that Barbara McMichael was doing a great job as editor. The director will review the situation with her and W. Finefrock. The following events were discussed:

Chandler's Cove Show, Aug. 26, Chairman Adatto. There were 19 classics out of 54 cars displayed. Each entrant was given a \$25 gift certificate. The club donation will be sent soon. Sponsors are lined up for next year. Garage Tour/Auction, Sept. 30, Chairman McGary handed out copies of the flier and slips for auction donations. He urged phone committee to complete their contacts of the member-

Annual meeting, Nov. 3, Chairman Deibel reports all on schedule. Christmas Party, Dec., Chairman Bomstead. Deibel reports that discussions between him, the chairman and N. Cook concerned location (the truck center or Seattle Country Club, either still a possibility) and format (brunch is probably out). A member of the Seattle CC is needed for a sponsor if there. McGary will check with Carl Bomstead about this. Coming-out Party, Feb. 1991, Chairmen B. McMichael/G. Mounger.

Grand Classic, July 13, 1991, Chairmen G. Greenfield/P. Grisham reported that Bellevue Embassy Suites is still in the running. The relatively secluded Boeing Computer Services parking lot northeast of the hotel could be used as the classic judging area. R. Gerrity will contact Boeing officials about this. A rain alternative needs to be found. Suites start at \$89, banquet price ca. \$25, lunch \$10. Several volunteers were lined up for sub-committees. Ajudging seminar will be held next Spring.In other Club business, A. McEwan urged support of regional member Joe Carman for national board membership, including contacting members of other regions. Al mentioned he would lead a RROC tour to California next May. P. Grisham mentioned the Pierce-Arrow meet afterwards. The director appointed a nominating committee consisting of S. Madden, J. Kane, and W. Deibel. The board approved selection of up to six candidates. The meeting was adjourned at 9 pm. The next meeting will be Oct. 3, 1990 at Latitude 47.



### Board of Managers, Minutes, Oct. 3, 1990

The meeting was called to order by Director Rittenhouse at 7 pm at Latitude 47 Restaurant in Seattle. Present were Managers Deibel. Gerrity, Goffette, Kane, Madden and McGary; Secretary Barber; Treasurer Wouters, Past-Director Greenfield; Editor McMichael; members Adatto, Aker, Armstrong, Cook, Grisham, Hooper, Meden and Mote; and guest Ron Lieber. The minutes of the Sept. 5, 1990 meeting were approved as corrected. The treasurer reported a balance of \$5284.78.

The following events were discussed:

Garage Tour/Auction, Sept 30. Chairman McGary expressed his thanks to all. The tour went fine and he felt that his goals for the auction had been essentially met: 100 people, over 75 items sold at nearly \$5K (\$4626). A good event, but he recommended we don't have it next year.

Annual Meeting, Nov 3. Chairman Deibel reports all OK, with nohost cocktails at 6:30, dinner and meeting at 7:30 and a one-hour film program. There are two menu choices. Spencer award is being handled by D. Aker and Schoenfeld award by T. Barber, A total ofnine Car-ofthe-Day events were identified. E. Rittenhouse will obtain trophies for these.

Christmas Party, Dec., Chairman Bomstead. No definite plans yet, but Deibel reports his truck center is still available. The possibility of no party was discussed, with a donation to charity instead, N. Cook suggested checking Salty's Restaurant for a brunch on about Dec. 15.

Coming-out Party, Feb. 23, 1991. Chairman B. McMichael has arranged for the Atrium at 7th and Orcas. Dinner will be about \$25 per person.

Grand Classic, July 13, 1991, Co-Chairman Greenfield/Grisham, GC committee meetings will commence at the beginning of the December board meeting.

The Nominating Committee (Chairman Sissy Madden) reported that six candidates had been selected and all accepted: Richard Adatto, Carl Bomstead, Roy Magnuson, Hal Meden, Don Reddaway and Bob Reverman. Three of these will be elected to replace retiring board
