informative, many ideas were brought forth for events including fund raising ideas. One theme which was fairly consistent was the question of how to recruit younger members.








Denny Aker's 1932 Auburn convertible sedan looks right at home in restaurant parking lot.


Director says, 'Don't miss the Grand Classic'







Board Meeting, November 3, 1990

The meeting was called to order by Director Rittenhouse at 7 pm at the Sandpoint Country Club in Seattle. A preliminary meeting of the Board of Managers was attended by managers Deibel, Goffette, Kane, Madden, McGary and Mounger; Past Director Greenfield; Editor McMichael; Secretary Barber and Treasurer Wouters; Membership Chr. Johnsen, and nominees Adatto and Reddaway. The minutes of the October 3, 1990, Board meeting and the previous Annual Meeting were accepted. Nominating Committee Chr. Madden reported that candidates Adatto, Bomstead, and Reddaway had been elected replacing outgoing Board members Cook, Gerrity and Goffette.

The Board chose EdRittenhouse as Director for another term and Bill Deibel as Assistant Director. Editor McMichael, Membership Chr. Johnsen, Secretary Barber and Treasurer Wouters continue in

The Director asked the Board to consider moving the election to an earlier date and also requested that the process of electing officers be clarified by the next Annual Meeting.

At the main Annual Meeting convened after dinner, the Director welcomed guests and gave thanks to Glenn Mounger as retiring Assistant Director and to the retiring Board members. He announced the new Board members and officers (see above). Continuing Board members are Madden, McGary, Rittenhouse (one more year) and Deibel, Kane and Mounger (two more years). The minutes of the previous Annual Meeting and the Annual Financial Report (showing a balance of \$6,820.62) were accepted as presented, Membership Chr. Johnsen reported a total of 203 members. The Director reviewed the year's activities (shows, auction and Caravan) and encouraged support of upcoming events, especially the Grand Classic July 12-14 (Co-Chr. Grisham and Greenfield).

Director Rittenhouse also encouraged members to support regional member Joe Carman who is running for the National Board. Ballots to select a new regional logo were passed out.



Board Meeting, December 5, 1990

The meeting was called to order by Director Rittenhouse at 7 pm at Latitude 47 Restaurant in Seattle. Present were Managers Adatto, Deibel, Kane, Madden, McGary and Mounger; Secretary Barber; Treasurer Wouters; Editor McMichael; Membership Chr. Johnsen; and members Aker, Crook, Goffette, Grisham, Lewontin, Linke, McEwan, Scheef and Tallman. The minutes of the November 3, 1990 Annual Meeting were approved as corrected. Membership Chr. Johnsen reported six new members but noted they owned only a total of two classics. Treasurer Wouters reported a balance of \$6,835.87. Caravan Chr. McEwan noted that a substantial amount would be returned to the club treasury from the Caravan fund by the end of the year. In a discussion of the Annual Meeting, the Director expressed his thanks to Chr. Deibel who reported 68 members and guests attended. There was a loss of approximately \$100, smaller than the loss the

Some suggestions from the Board for improving future attendance included retaining the program (enjoyed by those attending), checking football schedules and a possible weeknight schedule. It was felt that mentioning "black tie optional" on the announcement puts people off by implying more formality than is intended. Upcoming scheduled events were discussed as follows:

Dec. 16 - Christmas Party, Salty's Restaurant, Chr. Bomstead, G. Mounger reporting. Flyers out, but not much response yet. Use of phone committee is possible. Classic parking may require guards.

Feb 23 - Coming-Out Party, Design Center Atrium, Chrs. McMichael and Mounger reported six classics lined up.

July 13 - Grand Classic, Embassy Suites Bellevue, Chrs. Greenfield and Grisham. \$500 deposit is paid. Sub-committees are needed for finance, publicity, and hospitality suite hosts. Budget figures for National publicity need to be set. Mounger proposed an add-on driving event to the HoodCanal/Olympic Peninsula area. McEwan cautioned about advance booking.

The following 1991 calendar proposals were discussed: repeat of Bellevue Place display (Adatto) possibly with 20 cars. He will discuss a March date with sponsors. Chandler's Cove, August 25 (Adatto/ Madden/Linke). Coordinate with RROC as before. Kite Fly-In, May (Goffette). Possibly include overnight at Capt. Whidbey's, but this might conflict with Land/Sea/Air at Port Ludlow (Grisham) which is still tentatively on. Restoration/judging seminar, Crook's, April 20. GC Head Judge Deibel picked up 8 volunteers for GC judging. Deibel mentioned that we have several BC members and proposed a tour to include attending "Phantom of the Opera" at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre in Vancouver, possibly June or September.

Adatto mentioned a drive to an estate in Tacoma possibly in mid July. This might conflict with the GC or Forest Grove, So far, no conflicts were noted with the Apker Affair (Aug. 11) or Pebble Beach (Aug. 18).

In other new business, Mounger proposed "keeper" plaques for the Schoenfeld award as now done for the Spencer award. The Board approved and Mounger will work on a design proposal, as well as a final version for the club logo. He also volunteered to help edit the

The meeting was adjourned at 9 pm. The next Board meeting will be January 2, 1991 at Latitude 47.


