


A SHORT HISTORY OF AERODYNAMIC AUTOMOBILE DESIGN, OR THERE'S A TEAR IN MY BEER AND I'M CRYING OVER YOU SCHOOL OF AUTO DESIGN PART II by Jeff Anschell

■ The Contours of the 1935 Auburn 851 Speedster worked so well. Gordon Buehrig did the entire design job along with his team on the boattail beauty in just two weeks. The car was built-up from left over 1933 speedsters

of Al Leamy's design. Although only about 600 speedsters were built, they were a sensation and set the tone for

"pontoonfender" and the compound curve in auto design to come.

■ The Auburn Speedster set the stage for another masterpiece from the hand of Gordon Buehrig. The 810 / 812 Cord,



affectionately referred to as "Coffin Nose" attracted the attention of all the body builders and rocked the motoring world

with it's unusual design. No other car has endured so well from that era.

Panhard always had it's own way of doing things, note the 3 section windshield and skirted fenders on this 1937 Panhard Dynamic of 1937. It featured apart from its unique aerodynamic shape a backbone chassis, torsion-bar suspension, worm drive

and central driving position that was later discarded. Like most Panhards that ever graced this earth the public did not


understand it and was soon out of production.

■ This Talbot-Lago by the famed Figoni Et Falaschi with its Goutte D'Eau teardrop design had come a long way since the first aerodynamic designs

like the (Jamais Contente) and the (Rumpler Tropfenwagen) Refinement of the aero design had been an evolutionary process. At last art

and engineering had come together and in such a masterful way.


■ Bugatti had similar ideas to Talbot-Lago in this teardrop design coupe. Its very handsome bodywork along with what makes Bugatti go, made for a supercar of its day. The overall design or



elements of it were used on several subsequent cars. This design concept with its sheer elegance and

famed Bugatti engineering could not be matched.

■ We come to the end of an era with the Phantom Corsair, this slope-nose design with its Cord 812 running gear, came at the end of the age of the streamlined auto. World War II, tail fins of the 50's would come before we looked at aerodynamics again in car design, but we are thankful that names like Chapron, Saoutchik, LeBaron, Rollston, Willoughby, Brunn and Graber were all part of auto design history.

Classic Car Club of America - Pacific Northwest Region Board of Managers Meetings Reported by Ted Barber, Secretary, CCCA-PNR

The meeting was called to order by Director Bomstead at about 6:30 pm at Latitude 47 Restaurant in Seattle. Present were Managers Adatto, Doss, Magnuson, McMichael, Reddaway, and Wouters (Treasurer); Secretary Barber; Past Director Deibel; members Apker, Culp, Greenfield, Grisham, Hooper, Kane, McAuliffe, McEwan, Mote, Murray, Rittenhouse, and Zuker. The minutes of the May 5, 1993 meeting were approved as corrected. Treasurer Wouters reported a balance of \$16,108.15 including \$195 dues received and roster costs of \$937.24. Editor Doss reported that the next deadline is June 7, the issue to be sent out June 28 - July 1. Membership Chr Mote reported 143 members, including 12 new members. Ar addendum to the roster with corrections will be sent out. A combined Regional National membership form will be included in future publications.

Bill Deibel reported, in the absence of J. Carman, that National encourages seat belts in Classics if installed in a workmanlike manner. Some changes in Grand Classics have been suggested to increase interest, such as concours-type judging. In a brief report, Director Bomstead announced that National was considering a simplification in the awards given out at Grand Classics and National Annual Meets to save about \$300. He also announced that the review of the by-laws was to be discussed next meeting. The Board approved the selection of Bill Deibel to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of John Martin. Director Bomstead announced that the Awards Committee would have a report for the BG on their recommendations. He and G. Mounger attended the Washington Car Council meeting last month. Chr Magnuson announced that 12 cars had participated in the May 22 Kite Fly tour with the RROC.

Upcoming CCCA events were discussed by Assistant Director Adatto as follows: June 6, 1993 Picnic at Joe Carman's. (Joint meet with RROC). Bring your own picnic. (\$7 fee for entry to Garden show after

lunch.) Cars will start from Southcenter at 10 am. Car photos will be taken in Garden. June 18-20, 1993 Land / Sea / Air Rendezvous.

Chr. Culp announced that there was now a waiting list.
July 4, 1993, Parade and Bainbridge events as

before. (Contacts McEwan and Mounger.) T. Armstrong has invited Club members to come to the Sovren NW Vintage races at Seattle Inter national Raceways as before on July 3 and 4. Premier parking will be available for Classics on the Fourth. \$5 per ticket will benefit COH. Tom has invited Club members and guests to his pit

July 9, 10, 1993 Grand Classic. Chr. Bomstead assisted by J. Kane. Location: McAuliffe's. Banquet Chr B McMichael. S. Starr will head tabulation. G. Apker and D. Aker will serve as meet judges. The Board decided that no fee will be charged members for merely viewing cars. Registration fee will be \$15 as before. The Friday event is to be held at Suite 200 (Club Auto Limited).
