
The attendance seemed up a little from last year.



Port Gardner is always a really fun event for participants, while contributing to the future of some children and families in Everett and Snohomish County. Everyone wins.

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




Jerry Greenfield's 1935 Packard 12 - Dual Cowl Phaeton won the Packard Class.



















# Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance




# Newberg Vintage Festival


his was my first time attending The Newberg Vintage Festival in Newberg, Oregon. I know it won't be my last!

Saturday Rick was up early to be at the field by 9 a.m. The cars were






