


South Sound Tour

"The Pierce County Drive Into History"

eing accustomed to high risk gambles may not be essential, but it sure must be helpful for the would-be tour organizer choosing the last weekend in October for a western Washington tour. In our case, however, the gamble paid-off when Sunday, October 27th arrived clear and dry with a soft, muted sunshine throughout the day. As a result, last minute deciders swelled participation in "The Pierce County Drive Into History" from a planned 40 to 54 even with four no-shows. The result was a nice balance of ten classics from the PNR and ten Corvettes from the Corvette Marque Club of Seattle, our invitees, was disturbed only by an eleventh Corvette driven by a PNR member. It was particularly nice to see Bill and Janis Clarke show up driving all the way from Vancouver, BC in their 1947 Rolls Royce Silver Wraith Park Ward Limousine.

Virtually all participants arrived early at the new Washington State History Museum in downtown Tacoma, and they were lined up to enter when the doors opened at 11 a.m. (Even Bob Reverman, who had forgotten to set his clocks back to standard time, arrived early much to his great embarrassment). This museum, housed in a a very impressive new structure next to the old Tacoma Union Station, portrays the history of Washington State from its discovery by European explorers until the present with exhibits constructed from a combination of historical artifacts, new replicas and old photographs. Emphasis is placed on showing how life was lived by the ordinary working person hunters, traders, miners, loggers, aircraft builders, etc. as well as on the portrayal of the native Indian culture and civilization. The representation is all on one floor with a second display floor used for traveling exhibits such as the current "Sacred Encounters -Father DeSmet and the Indians of the Rocky Mountain West" which runs through January 5, 1997. We found this exhibit as interesting, if not more so than the principle exhibit. It depicts the activities of Father Jean DeSmet, a Flemish Jesuit missionary from Belgium, who was recruited from St. Louis by a delegation of Salish to establish a mission among the Salish and Coeur d'Alene

Leaving the museum we toured as a group along the Tacoma waterfront to the Tacoma Yacht Club at Point Defiance. A lovely parkway makes this a very pleasant drive. At the yacht club a delicious lasagna buffet lunch was provided in the Northwest Room affording a great view out over the water where a fleet of sailboats lay becalmed waiting to start a race. The race was finally canceled and the racers all came in to the yacht club before we left on the main tour route following the Narrows to historic Steilacoom, incorporated in 1854. Unfortunately the tour was planned to reach Steilacoom over scenic Chambers Creek Road which was subsequently closed for repair necessitating a roundabout last minute rerouting. During this leg it was easy to see that our tour was occurring at the very height of the Fall colors which added a special pleasure to the afternoon drive.

From Steilacoom we toured to Northwest Landing, a Weyerhauser planned community in the making, at Du Pont. Quite a few houses are already completed and occupied, and many more are in process with a traditional architecture reminiscent of the "Craftsman Style" popular in the early 20th century prior to and right after World War I. In the process we passed by the new Du Pont Campus of Intel Corporation just being completed there.

Leaving Northwest Landing we drove through the quaint little original village of Du Pont before entering Fort Lewis to visit the Fort Lewis Military Museum which is devoted to the history of Fort Lewis. The army units that have been based there since its founding as Camp Lewis in 1917 and the uniforms, arms and vehicles associated with these units. No doubt most readers have noticed many times this small specialized museum which lies right along I-5, but have never taken the time to stop for a visit. It is in fact quite interesting and worth the time to stop, as is, of course, the Washington History Museum.

Unfortunately, despite a very easily followed tour map provided for each navigator, the tour route traced in color no less, about half the participants were led astray prior to reaching Northwest Landing by a pied piper and only rejoined the group at the military museum. (How do you ever make your way through a wiring diagram, Mote, if you can't read a road map?)


Ron also announced the election of Ed Rittenhouse, Brian Pollock and Rick Turner to serve three-year terms on the Board.


Holiday Party




